The Buckeye Trail's history begins in 1958 and the trail - and the Buckeye Trail Association - have grown through the years. Our speaker will share how 2025 marks an exciting new chapter in BTA history, as the Buckeye Trail is in the midst of a Feasibility Study to determine whether it could become the twelfth National Scenic Trail, a designation already enjoyed by the North Country Trail and Appalachian Trail. The presentation will cover the history of the Buckeye Trail as well as some of its geological and biological highlights. If you've ever wondered what that splash of blue paint on a tree meant . . . you'll find out during this presentation.

Meg is a life member of the Buckeye Trail Association, currently serving as Vice-chair/ Secretary for the Crooked River Chapter. She was gifted the trail name "Meriwether" and finished section hiking the entire Buckeye Trail in March 2023.

The Birdman of Oberlin

Lynds Jones (1865-1951) was a pioneering ornithologist and ecologist from Ohio who is



responsible for many of the common practices that recreational birders take for granted as "standard practice" in the field, more than a century later. including keeping lists, doing Big Days and the Christmas Bird Count.

At Oberlin College in 1892,

Jones began teaching ornithology, which was the first course of its kind ever offered at an American college or university. Not only was he a professor at Oberlin for nearly four decades, Jones also had a tremendous impact on the fields of ornithology and recreational birding. He founded both an ornithological society (The Wilson Ornithological Society, 1888) and a journal (now the Wilson Journal of Ornithology, 1889); both are active today.

Jones was also an early pioneer and mentor in ecology and founded the first-ever department of

animal ecology in 1915.

Diana Steele has been a science writer for more than 30 vears. She is an avid birder and has birded in all 50 U.S. states and six continents. An active volunteer with Black River Audubon Society, she is a birding guide on the Lake Erie Islands and a former board member of the Ohio Ornithological Society.

### # 74 on the Lake Erie Birding Trail

Use your car as a moving observation blind on the wildlife drive at <a href="Ottawa NWR">Ottawa NWR</a>. Gates for this free auto tour open at sunrise and close one hour prior to sunset. We can step out of our vehicles at designated pull-off locations on the 7-mile route to take photos or set up spotting scopes. The wildlife drive allows visitors into otherwise restricted areas of the refuge.

We should be able to find a good variety of ducks, Trumpeter Swans, Sandhill Cranes and shorebirds, depending on water levels in the diked wetlands. Ottawa NWR has a nice lodge-style visitor's center with restrooms. Be sure to notice the windows of the center and the various styles of treatment to prevent bird strikes. There are closely spaced dots, stripes and bird images that can be seen from the outside but still allow light inside.

If you'd like to carpool, let us know at blackbrookaud@aol.com and we'll meet at the Rt. 306 parking lot of Lakeland Community College at 7:30 a.m. Otherwise, meet us in the visitor's center at 14000 West State Route 2 in Oak Harbor.

With a limited selection of restaurants in the area, you can bring a sack lunch or we can stop at <u>Blackberry</u> Corners Tavern only 4½ miles from Ottawa.

Established in 1961, Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge protects a network of wetlands, grasslands and forests on about 9,000 acres. The Refuge straddles both Lucas and Ottawa Counties and is managed by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service. It's nestled between Magee Marsh Wildlife Area to the east and Metzger Marsh Wildlife Area and Howard Marsh Metropark to the northwest. All of these special areas were once part of the Great Black Swamp, which stretched from Lake Erie to just over the Indiana border, about 40 miles wide and 120 miles long. Settlement was very difficult here but the Swamp was eventually drained by 1900 for farming and timber harvest. Remnants of the former swamp can be seen at Goll Woods State Nature Preserve, Magee Marsh Wildlife Area, Forrest Woods Nature Preserve, and East Harbor State Park.

### # 2 on the Lake Erie Birding Trail

We'll head out to Ashtabula County to visit one of three natural areas owned by the Cleveland Museum of Natural History that are open to the public. It's the only known Ohio nesting site for the White-throated Sparrow (Zonotrichia albicollis). The North Kingsville Sand Barrens protects the only high-quality fossil dune ridge still preserved in Northeast Ohio. Nearly a mile long, about 300 feet wide, and 30 feet deep, the sand ridge is a remnant of an older lake shoreline that predates Lake Erie. The 182-acre preserve supports endangered plants, several rare invertebrates, and a population of Wild Lupine. Wild or Sundial Lupine is the host plant for the endangered Karner Blue butterfly. Caterpillars of the Frosted Elfin, Eastern Tailed-Blue and several moths also feed from this bluepurple legume, which prefers sandy soil.

The site features a trail that winds through open, sandy barrens, drier uplands, and lush, seep-fed wetlands and woods.

To find North Kingsville Sand Barrens, take I-90 to the Route 193 exit. Follow Route 193 north to U.S. Route 20, east to Poore Road. The preserve is on the west side of Poore Road just north of the tracks.

## Monthly bird walk at Veterans Park

Come on our monthly bird walk for a mix of woods, wetland and wildlife viewing at Veterans Park. We'll meet at 8:00 a.m. on the fourth Sunday of every month in the main parking lot at 5730 Hopkins Road in Mentor. The path is level.

The list on eBird shows 206 species here. Just under a mile from Lake Erie, Granger Pond and tree cover at <u>Veterans Park</u> offer birds shelter from blustery lake conditions. We can lend out a couple pairs of binoculars.

# Witness the Return of Avian Migrants at Blackbrook's Walks and Big Sit

The <u>Cleveland-area Spring Bird Walk Series</u>, now in its 92<sup>nd</sup> year, lets us celebrate the arrival of birds who have migrated back here to nest or are stopping to refuel on their way to breeding sites north. Blackbrook invites everyone to our spring bird walk route at the north end of Mentor Marsh State Nature Preserve and <u>Headlands Beach State Park</u>. Meet in the Zimmerman trailhead parking lot at 9600 Headlands Road, west of Shipman Pond, at 7:30 a.m. on these Sundays: **April 14, 21, 28 and May 5, 12, 19**.

On the last Sunday of the Spring Bird Walk Series, May 18, you can go on the walk or perch at our "Big **Sit**" in the picnic area by the entrance to <u>Headlands</u> Dunes State Nature Preserve. Bring a chair, a cup or mug and a potluck brunch item to share, if you'd like, after 8:30 a.m. to the far eastern side of Headlands Beach State Park at parking area P-1. The state park and state nature preserve share a common entrance at the northern terminus of State Route 44 (Heisley Road) in Lake County. Blackbrook will supply coffee as we scan the nearby shrubs and trees for warblers, vireos and other migrants taking a break before they cross the lake. This is a perfect outing for less mobile folks who enjoy group birding. Public restrooms are nearby and so is the entrance to the handicappedaccessible boardwalk to the beach.



### **Eagles and Osprey Starting Families**

During our Spring Bird Walks, we can view the Mentor Marsh Bald Eagle nest from the bridge over Shipman Pond. In their 16<sup>th</sup> year of nesting, this pair began incubation on February 8 and feeding behavior about St. Paddy's Day. It will be a few weeks before the eyases (raptor nestlings) are mature enough to be visible over the top of the nest so we can tell how many hatched. Nesting phenology involves a lot of hard work by the parents throughout the process of raising young eagles. The Mentor Marsh Facebook page has updates.

The Osprey pair returned in March to their nest on the cell phone tower at Lakeshore Blvd. Watch for updates on the same Facebook page.

### Blackbrook Audubon Wraps Up Another Year with a Potluck Picnic

This winter, several of us really appreciated the fireplace in the picnic shelter during our 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday bird walks at <u>Veterans Park</u>, the one Lake Metroparks manages for the City of Mentor. After we enjoy some summer fare and catching up with fellow nature lovers, we'll take a bird walk and see what we can find in Granger Pond and the woods surrounding it. Granger Pond's wide expanse attracts both fishermen and birds such as herons, kingfishers and the occasional egret. The <u>list on eBird.org</u> shows 206 species for this location.

### If you ever wanted your own spotting scope ...

Blackbrook Audubon has been given two spotting scopes with tripods, plus an additional tripod, by a very generous anonymous donor. We will begin selling raffle tickets in April with drawings to be held at our June  $17^{\rm th}$  picnic at Veterans Park in Mentor. Winners need not be present to win. Proceeds from the raffles will be used to help equip the new quarantine wing at the Lake Metroparks Wildlife Center.

A ticket will cost \$5 for the chance to win a never used photography tripod still sealed in its original wrapping. It is a Sunpak Platinum Plus 7500 Pro Heavy Duty tripod for still, digital, or video cameras up to 11 pounds. It extends to 74.8 inches. The approximate value is \$100.

A separate raffle ticket to win either of the spotting scope sets will cost \$15. The winner will choose between

A used Carl Zeiss Diascope 85T\*F with 20-60x zoom lens, Zeiss fitted cover, and mounting plate. It attaches to a Carl Zeiss telescoping tripod with mounting head. This is a top-of-the-line scope in terms of optical quality. The estimated value of the used scope is about \$1,500 plus \$125 for the tripod.

Or

A used Kowa TSN-2 77mm spotting scope with 20-60x zoom lens, fitted Kowa cover, and mounting plate. It attaches to a Bogen

model 3130 tripod with mounting head. Estimated value for the used scope is about \$450 and \$150 for the tripod.

Another drawing will be held at a later date to determine the winner of the second spotting scope. Tickets will be available for purchase at our April 15 speaker program and at City of Mentor's Earth Day celebration at



Springbrook Gardens. Please talk to a Blackbrook Audubon board member if you're interested in purchasing a ticket and helping get the Wildlife Center's quarantine space ready to admit and treat wildlife.



### **How to Share Space with Birds**

- 1. Plant native
- 2. Make windows visible
- 3. Protect insects avoid pesticides
- **4. Restrain your pets**Leashes for dogs, catios for cats
- 5. Be the solution to plastic pollution
  Bring reusable bags to the grocery
- **6. Purchase sustainable foods**Like shade-grown coffee and chocolate
- 7. Dim the lights at night

  Turning off lights helps insects too!

## **ALAN Makes Life Tough for Fireflies**

Artificial Light at Night (ALAN) obscures natural <u>firefly bioluminescence</u>, making it harder for them to find mates, ward off predators and disperse as larvae.

- Use motion detectors or timers to limit the amount of time lights shine.
- Shield lights so they only illuminate the intended area, such as a pathway.
- Switch bright outdoor lighting for red bulbs or cover existing bulbs with red filters.
- Close curtains at night to reduce the amount of indoor light that spills outdoors.

Light pollution comes in several forms, including **Skyglow** - glowing haze over highly populated areas **Light trespass** - reaches beyond intended/needed area **Glare** - light that excessively illuminates areas or objects

## Celebrate World Migratory Bird Day by improving bird habitat with us the evening of May 8

We'll pull invasive garlic mustard and pick up trash from the area around Shipman Pond. Park in the lot



by the north Zimmerman trailhead at 9600 Headlands Road, Mentor at **6:00 pm** on **Thursday, May 8.** 

The hillside pictured to the left isn't this bad anymore, but garlic mustard seeds persist for a decade, so we have to follow up and check for new plants. Wear sturdy footwear

for off-trail work and bring garden or work gloves.

# The Gateway to Birding Ohio's Lake Erie Shoreline

The Ohio Division of Wildlife and Ohio Sea Grant have released the updated edition of the Ohio Lake Erie Birding Trail Guidebook. More compact than the original of 10 years ago, this book is a 115-page compilation of 90 popular and lesser-known birding spots all along Ohio's 316 miles of Lake Erie coast, from Conneaut to Swanton near the



Indiana border. They added Howard Marsh Metropark and Chagrin River Park to the birding trail. The 5.5" x 8.5" guidebook includes a pull-out trail map and current birding checklist. The book

and separate map/checklist can be ordered from <a href="Ohio State's Stone Lab store">Ohio State's Stone Lab store</a>. The guidebook is \$15.

The Division will turn their attention to Ohio's southern shore to create the **Ohio River Birding Trail**, with a guidebook to come. These publications are financed with grants and proceeds from sales of cardinal and Bald Eagle license plates, the <u>Ohio Wildlife Legacy Stamp</u> and donations to the state income tax checkoff program.

### Commemorate Cuyahoga Valley National Park's 50th with Set of Stickers

One way Ohio's only national park is celebrating their 50th anniversary is with a set of 15 stickers that represent a cultural, historical, and recreational aspect of the Cuyahoga Valley. You can collect the stickers by attending National Park Service programs and the Lyceum Series by Conservancy for CVNP. Stickers will be distributed for free while supplies last. A collectible poster and stickers are sold at Trail Mix Peninsula and Boston Mill Visitor Center.







The <u>Cuyahoga Valley Trails Council</u> is celebrating 40 years of trail building and maintenance. The 4<sup>th</sup> edition of their <u>Trail Guide</u> came out last summer. It's available at Trail Mix stores with royalties funding CVTC trail projects. It's also in some libraries.

# Missed January 100 by a Feather, But Still Something to Chirp about

Blackbrook's second January 100 for Fun attempt earlier this year fell a bit short at 97 species, but that just shows how challenging it can be to find that many birds when a <u>real</u> Ohio winter comes blowin' through and we decide to stay in. We endured a couple weeks of subfreezing high temperatures with negative wind chills, plus a few days of subzero temps. The birds used every adaptation they had to get through the cold and we did our best to find them.

Trevor Wearstler came up with the idea for Blackbrook to try a January 100 as a chapter and he compiled all the lists you turned in. You had the option of sharing your ebird list to our FriendsofBlackbrook account or sending lists via email. Trevor "cached" 66 checklists from 19 birders at 95 different sites in 11 counties. Whew!

The longest checklist had 33 species on January 5 from Cleveland Lakefront Nature Preserve. This is only one week before Blackbrook's field trip to the same spot where we saw 28 species. Our later stop at Canalway Center in the Ohio and Erie Canal Reservation yielded 20 species. Two species at CanalWay, Sharp-shinned Hawk and Great Egret, were new to the January 100 list, not recorded for the 2024 inaugural 100. In fact, Blackbrook had 14 new species this January over last. The other 12 were: Wood Duck, Horned Grebe, Red-throated Loon, Common Loon, Black Vulture, Turkey Vulture, American Barn Owl, Eastern Screech-Owl, Snowy Owl, Merlin, Cedar Waxwing and White-winged Crossbill.

If you braved the elements, or at least checked your feeders, and sent in a list, we thank you.


### **November Raffle Results**
